Community Development: From Outreach to Citizen Science



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For thousands of years, libraries have been centers of knowledge, bridging the past, present, and future. However, present libraries are more than just repositories of books; they are dynamic institutions reaching out to the heart of communities and adapting to their evolving needs.

The concept of community engagement or community development in libraries is not new. It is rooted in phrases like "service to the disadvantaged," "service to special groups," "outreach beyond the traditional library," and "community librarianship." Libraries have long been committed to extending their services to underserved and unserved populations—those who are visually impaired, homebound, marginalized, or unable to access traditional library services. This outreach reflects not only action but also symbolism, as libraries attempt to bridge gaps in information and promote **social justice**.

The historical contributions of figures like **Benjamin Franklin**, who founded America's first lending library in Philadelphia in 1731, and **Andrew Carnegie**, who dedicated his fortune to building libraries for public access, shaped the modern library movement. These visionaries recognized that libraries must serve the entire community, not just a privileged few. Likewise, **Melvil Dewey**, famous for the Dewey Decimal Classification system, supported the community engagement of university libraries. After being the Chief Librarian of University of British Columbia in 1883, he believed that libraries should serve everyone, not just students and faculty. In fact, he proposed that libraries remain open during evenings, holidays, and vacations—making libraries a resource for lifelong learning and community empowerment. **Dr. S.R. Ranganathan**, a pioneer in Library and Information Science, recognized the unique role of university libraries as community centers. His contribution in public library movement across India, was immense and pioneered in drafting bills that led to the Madras Public Libraries Act in 1948.

Today, Sri Lankan University Libraries are expanding their **outreach activities** in innovative ways. We see **collection-based outreach** with book clubs, author talks, scavenger hunts, and pop-up libraries in public spaces. Libraries also engage in **services-based outreach**, offering workshops, classes, and mobile reference services. There's also the "**Whole Person**" **outreach**, which addresses the mental and physical well-being of patrons through stress reduction programs, career help, yoga classes, and

health screenings. Some libraries organize **just-for-fun outreach** activities like arts and crafts, music, and games, while others form partnerships to promote community-focused initiatives, hosting clubs or cross-promoting services. Libraries even take part in **multi-pronged events** like "National Library Week" or "Banned Books Week", fostering a sense of community while promoting important causes.

Let us highlight a four powerful examples:

- 1. **The Foundation for Library Awareness (FOLA)**, founded in 2005 by the late Mrs. Srikanth-aluxmy Arulanantham, Librarian at the University of Jaffna, is an outstanding example. FOLA's mission to promote reading and library awareness, particularly in Northern Sri Lanka, has transformed countless lives. From organizing student competitions to hosting literacy workshops, introducing novel concepts such as the "Three Dimensional Library," "World of Knowledge," "Information Eye" "Records of Thought" Exhibitions to establishing a "Knowledge Stimulation Center", FOLA has been at the forefront of reading promotion. Its innovative programs like the "**Garland to a Book**" and partnerships with local and international organizations have improved its impact.
- 2. The University of Moratuwa Library also took a pioneering step by launching its Outreach Services Division (OSD) in 2013. The OSD was designed to build relationships with the surrounding community, offering programs like "Child Development Programme", "Reading Camp", "Mathematical Skills Development", "Reaching Technical Students" which ran for months and years, and some other special events celebrating "Reading and Literary Months". These programs have been instrumental in fostering a knowledge culture in the community.
- 3. South Eastern University of Sri Lanka (SEUSL) recognized the poor infrastructure of public libraries and school libraries in the Ampara district and established the South Eastern Regional Library & Information Network (SERLIN) in 2022. Through SERLIN, SEUSL has empowered regional libraries and promoted reading, enriching the lives of countless students and community members.
- 4. **Bolgoda Lake Project**, a self-funded, self-motivated collaborative initiative aimed at raising awareness among all stakeholders about the ecological significance of the **Bolgoda Lake Ecosystem**. Initiated by a senior lecturer and a librarian attached to University of Moratuwa, the project focuses on promoting sustainable practices for conservation and has a strong community outreach component. It brings together students, educators, librarians, business community, local governments and general public to address environmental concerns while providing real-world experience. The project's unique fusion of education, community engagement, and environmental sustainability exemplifies how libraries can play a pivotal role in addressing pressing local challenges and fostering environmental awareness. This initiative shows that libraries can go beyond their traditional roles and become **catalysts for societal change**.

Finally, we like to touch on an exciting new development—the partnership between citizen science and libraries.

Let's begin by defining citizen science. For those who may be unfamiliar, citizen science refers to scientific research conducted in whole or in part by nonprofessional scientists. It's a powerful way to engage the public in scientific inquiry and expand the scope of research projects. Imagine bird watchers contributing data to ornithology studies, or stargazers helping to classify galaxies; history buffs recording historical artefacts to contribute to research and preserve local heritage. That's citizen science in action (Fig. 1).

Now, you might be wondering, "What do libraries have to do with this?" Well, as it turns out, quite a lot! Libraries, as community hubs of knowledge and learning, are uniquely positioned to support and benefit from citizen science initiatives.

Citizen science allows libraries not only to lend books but actively contribute to **knowledge creation**. By involving patrons in research, libraries can elevate their status as key players in fields like ornithology, astronomy, or historical preservation. Libraries can also use citizen science to promote **inclusive knowledge creation**, giving community members the chance to engage in scientific endeavors.

Libraries can organize **citizen science workshops** where patrons learn how to collect and analyze data, partner with local research institutions for projects, and offer resources for patrons to engage with scientific tools. These initiatives can attract new users, generate positive media attention, and inspire the development of new services tailored to community interests.

If you are really interested, read about "Citizen Science Corner" at Diyasaru Park, Thalawathugoda which aims to increase the engagement of ordinary people in citizen science. It is a project by the Department of Forestry and Environmental Science, University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Libraries have ample opportunities connect with such projects.

Still we have two queries

Despite these centuries of service, **libraries face a challenge in modern times.** They have not captured society's attention the way influencers or YouTubers have, who seem to connect more readily with millions of people online, especially younger audiences. While influencers use entertainment and content creation to build vast followings, **libraries, as institutions of learning, are still struggling with how to reach society in this digital-first world**. We need to ask ourselves: how can libraries better communicate their value, relevance, and impact in the same way YouTubers and content creators have mastered?

While Sri Lankan libraries have made progresses in community engagement, there's still much more to be done, particularly in reaching disadvantaged and marginalized groups. Many rural areas, economically disadvantaged communities, and defamed groups like those with criminal records, sex workers, and LGBTQ+ individuals, still face significant barriers to accessing library services. Libraries must extend their outreach to ensure these communities are not left behind. For instance, libraries can support reentry for individuals with criminal records, provide resources and health information for sex workers, and offer inclusive resources for LGBTQ+ individuals. By addressing these gaps, libraries can fulfill their mission of providing universal access to information and fostering an inclusive society.

In conclusion, libraries are evolving into active hubs of community engagement, contributing not just to education but to social and scientific progress. As we continue to expand our outreach efforts, we strengthen our role in society, ensuring that libraries remain relevant, vital, and empowering institutions for all.

Quickly Catalog Your Books with AI Powered CATMELK

Libraries are facing demands to streamline their operations, adapt to rapidly evolving technologies, and meet user requests for speedy and efficient access to information. Efficient and standard compliant cataloging is a major solution to meet these demands. It, has traditionally considered a labor-intensive task requiring careful attention to detail. Standards required to be adhered to by modern libraries are MARC21, Resource Description and Access (RDA), and the National Library of Sri Lanka (NLSL) recommended Descriptive Bibliographic Framework (DBIB).

CATMELK is a Custom GPT on the ChatGPT platform, designed specifically to automate the cataloging process. This application offers an unparalleled solution for libraries seeking to enhance operational efficiency and user services. You only need your Smart Phone as a device, and access to the ChatGPT mobile app to perform the action. Otherwise, it is possible to use the CATMELK Web site (https://chatgpt.com/g/g-YQm6gByUe-catmelk) on desktop for achieving the same results.

The authors won the Best Innovators Award of 2024 for this application, at the Annual General Meeting of the University Librarians Association of Sri Lanka (ULA) held on 30th October 2024.

1. What is CATMELK?

CATMELK is a simple application that converts book images to catalog records. It is customized for library environments, so that the converted book descriptions can be copy-pasted or imported into the Integrated Library Management Systems as MARC21 records (currently, importing records needs an additional semi-automated process).

Technically it is a custom-built Generative Pre-trained Transformer (GPT). It utilizes artificial intelligence, more specifically advanced natural language processing (NLP) to interpret, analyze, and convert book metadata into MARC21 format. Unlike generic AI models, CATMELK is custom-designed for handling bibliographic records and library-specific data, ensuring high accuracy and adherence to cataloging standards.

Practically, it is like scanning a QR code using your mobile phone. Simply capture the book's image, run the application, and voilà! The catalog record instantly appears on the screen. The process is straightforward, and the time required to master it is minimal.

2. Practical Applications in Libraries

CATMELK's capabilities can be directly used by libraries. Some key applications have been given below.

2.1. Automated Cataloging

CATMELK can process book images (preferably the copyright page, title page, or the cover of the book or a combination of these) to generate MARC21-compliant records within seconds. The GPT then extracts relevant details such as author names, publication year, and subject headings, creating ready-to-use bibliographic records. As Joudrey and Taylor (2017) highlighted, maintaining bibliographic accuracy is essential for streamlining library operations. Records created by CATMELK are comprehensive and devoid of human errors. It makes the catalogers work much easier. In other words, CATMELK is a robotic assistant for catalogers.

2.2. Batch Processing

Libraries often acquire materials in bulk, which makes manual cataloging an overwhelming task. CAT-MELK simplifies this process by enabling batch uploads. In a single instance, four (04) images can be attached into the chat. However, a librarian can extract metadata for hundreds of titles during iterative instances, and CATMELK generates corresponding catalog records instantly. At the end of the session, the cataloger can instruct CATMELK to extract all MARC 21 records into a single MARC records list. This can be edited in a MARC editor, save as a MARC file (.mrc format) and import.

2.3. Multilingual Cataloging

In a multilingual country such as Sri Lanka, cataloging non-English resources is a considerable challenge. CATMELK supports multiple languages, enabling seamless cataloging of diverse material formats. As OpenAI (2023) explains, large language models excel in handling multilingual data. For instance, it can analyze metadata from books in Sinhala, Tamil, or any other language. However, keep in mind that low resource languages such as Sinhala and Tamil may not be accurately converted. Still, it is worthwhile trying and converting them with human supervision.

2.4. Training Novice Catalogers

CATMELK can also be used for training novice catalogers, since the application provides detailed instructions and justifications on why a particular tag has been selected for a given set of data.

2.5. Error Reduction

Human catalogers are prone to errors and biases, particularly when handling large volumes of data. CATMELK minimizes inaccuracies by utilizing optical character recognition and machine learning to standardize entries. Its ability to fix inconsistencies ensures higher data integrity.

2.6. Integration with Library Management Systems (LMS)

CATMELK integrates smoothly with popular LMS platforms. Once catalog records are generated, they can be imported into the library's system after following a simple procedure, reducing manual input.

3. Transformative Impact on Library Services.

The integration of CATMELK in library operations has numerous implications. One major benefit is enhanced efficiency. By automating repetitive tasks, librarians can focus on more strategic roles. Using CATELK is economical, both in terms of human hours and money spent on fixing errors. Improved accessibility ensures that materials are made available to users without delays, which enhances user satisfaction.

4. Some Challenges

Despite its advantages, integrating CATMELK into library operations may present challenges. Library staff may require basic training to interact with CATMELK effectively. The free ChatGPT version allows limited use of the application (currently up to approximately three instances of Plus-version capabilities per day). Therefore, continuous utilization of CATMELK requires a subscription to ChatGPT Plus. Need for a smart mobile device is a minor limitation. Even if the desktop version can be used, the mobile application is more efficient.

5. Conclusion

For libraries ready to embrace AI-driven cataloging, CATMELK offers not just a glimpse into the future but a practical, actionable solution. This can further be developed to make it a state-of-the-art cataloging application, with a streamlined workflow to integrate with Library Management Systems like Koha. It can also be trained to extract bibliographic information from designated sites on the Web, improving its functionality to another level.

However, it should be kept in mind that the application only 'supports', and it is not a complete replacement of the human cataloger. Humans must still oversee the functions and apply professional and learned judgements whenever required.

14th International Conference of University Librarians Association of Sri Lanka

The University Librarians Association of Sri Lanka hosted its 14th International Conference on October 29, 2024, at the Galle Face Hotel in Colombo, Sri Lanka. The conference, theme was "Artificial Intelligence Revolutionizing Library Services: Challenges and Opportunities", that explored the profound impact of Artificial Intelligence (AI) having on library services, addressing both the challenges and opportunities arising from this technological evolution. Dr. Mohamed Majeed Mashroofa, the President of the University Librarians Association 2023/24 chaired the conference. The Hon. (Dr) Harini Amarasuriya, the Prime Minister of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka graced the occasion as the Chief Guest.

Her esteemed presence at the proceedings added value to ICULA 2024. Along with her, the Guests of Honour Senior Prof. Wasantha Kumara, Vice-Chairman of the University Grants Commission, Prof. (Mrs.) G.A.S. Ginigaddara, Chairperson of the Committee of Vice-Chancellors and Directors (CVCD), and, Dr. U.L. Abdul Majeed, Acting Vice-Chancellor of South Eastern University of Sri Lanka, also graced the occasion. Researchers and professionals presented their papers on topics ranging from AI literacy among postgraduate students to the ethical complexities of authorship in AI-generated catalogue records.

Proceedings of ICUAL 2024 were launched in the presence of the Hon. Prime Minister, who awarded certificates for the prize winners of the Video competition conducted by ULA among undergraduates of state universities and school children.

The conference was an energetic platform for exchanging ideas, fostering collaboration, and ensuring that libraries continue to evolve and meet the demands of the digital age while maintaining their core mission of promoting knowledge and learning.






International Collaboration

The event was organized by the Human Resource Development Unit in collaboration with the University Library, offering a unique opportunity to appreciate and understand the historical and cultural significance of this remarkable manuscript.



Cultural Preservation

Opening of the Library of Tamilology - 29th October, 2024

The opening of the Library of Tamilology at the University of Jaffna on 29th October, 2024, marked the successful completion of a project dedicated to preserving and advancing Tamil literature, history, and culture. Approved by the University Council on 9th June, 2021, this library has been realised through the allocation of 111 million rupees from the Kandiah Karthigesan Trust Fund (KKTF), established by the late philanthropist Singapore Estate Kandiah Karthigesan.

The Library of Tamilology is a specialised library focused on collecting, preserving, and disseminating knowledge related to Tamilology, with a particular emphasis on Sri Lankan Tamil heritage. Its extensive collection includes published and unpublished works by Sri Lankan and international writers and researchers, covering various languages and formats.

The scope of Tamilology in the library extends across diverse subjects reflecting the daily life, culture, and traditions of the Tamil people. The collection encompasses indigenous literature, including grammar, lexicons, epics, lyric poetry, dramas, theology, medicine, philosophy, and moral treatises. It also contains jurisprudential and folk literature, offering insights into the community's rites, rituals, customs, manners, legends, fables, diseases, medicines, and educational practices. Together, these materials provide a comprehensive understanding of Tamil society and culture from ancient times to the present.

The library features a dedicated section called Yālppāṇa Karuvoolam, focusing on preserving and archiving both published and unpublished works related to Sri Lankan Tamil heritage. Accessible to the public, the Library of Tamilology is a vital resource for researchers, scholars, and anyone interested in exploring the depth of Tamil heritage. In addition to its extensive collection, the library coordinates academic programs such as the Tamil Palapandithar Diploma and the Tamil Pandithar Higher Diploma, offered through the Centre for Open and Distance Learning (CODL).

The library actively engages in scholarly activities, including maintaining Tamiliyal Karuvoolam, a digital repository documenting and archiving the lives and works of Sri Lankan Tamil scholars and poets. It also compiles and publishes rare books and releases bibliographies, indexes, and documentaries, all of which significantly contribute to the academic and cultural enrichment of Tamil studies.








Library Quality Assurance

User Tracking System at the Library, University of Peradeniya



Mr. B.E.S. Bandara, Assistant Librarian of the faculty of Medicine has developed an innovative system to track library user statistics, providing a critical tool for the University of Peradeniya's libraries. Previously, there was no comprehensive mechanism to monitor library usage, with some branch libraries relying on manual systems. This innovation allows for efficient tracking of all users registered with the Koha Integrated Library System or Alice for Windows Library System.

The system has already demonstrated its impact: in its first month, over 5,000 users visited the Main Library. Initially implemented and verified at the Medical Library, the system received commendation from the library committee there. It enables librarians and other authorized personnel to generate and filter user statistics within seconds, streamlining data access and analysis.

Currently, the system has been installed at the Medical Library and Main Library. Other branches, such as the Agriculture and Veterinary Libraries, have requested the installation. Mr. B.E.S. Bandara, the branch Librarian of the Medical Library, will oversee the implementation and training processes for these libraries.

Mr. Bandara attributes the success of this project to the invaluable support and guidance provided by the Librarian of the University of Peradeniya. He also acknowledges the valuable contributions of Mr. M.J.A. Saajith, Assistant Network Manager at the Library of South Eastern University of Sri Lanka, for his support and expertise. Furthermore, he extends his sincere appreciation to the senior staff of the library and the IT division for their unwavering assistance, which was crucial in achieving this milestone. The implementation of the User Tracking System at the University of Peradeniya's libraries aligns closely with the principles of Quality Assurance (QA) in library services.


Student Support




Knowledge Sharing Forum Library series 01- Anuradhapura Regional Centre Library-






Workshop on "Introduction to Electronic Resources Available in OUSL Library"






Data Visualization Camp
